1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Kalicharan P. G. College, Lucknow is one of the esteemed institutions of learning and is situated on the bank of holy river Gomti in Chowk area of West-Lucknow. This institution is being run by Kalicharan Vidyalaya Endowment Trust, Lucknow which was constituted in 1912. Since beginning District Magistrate, Lucknow is ex-offcio President of this institution. Founder Manager of Kalicharan Vidyalaya Endowment Trust was Honorable Babu Ganga Prasad Verma. He was a renowned journalist, a social worker and also founder member of Indian National Congress in 1885.

The college was established by a prominent social worker Late Lala Kalicharan Mehrotra in 1913 as Kalicharan High school. In 1948 it developed into an Intermediate college which later became a Degree college in 1973 and grew into a Post Graduate College from session 2005-06.

A very prominent figure of Hindu Literature late Babu Shyam Sundar Das was the first Principal of Kalicharan High School. This college is associated with University of Lucknow and is presently running courses in Arts and Commerce faculty. The courses available are B.A, B.Com, M.A. (Hindi & Sociology) and M.Com (Pure Commerce & Applied Economics).

The college offers eight subjects at under graduate level including Hindi, Sociology, A.I.H, Economics, Political Science, Education, Asian Culture, Physical Education and four Post Graduate Programs, besides other major subjects of Commerce. Presently Dr. R.K. Tandon is working efficiently as manager of this institution and the college is growing by leaps and bounds under his supervision.

Vision

The founders of the college envisioned to impart education to all the sections of the society to empower them as a class of intellectually, morally and spiritually sound and committed citizens who will become not only professionally qualified but also gave a vision for the betterment of the society and the building of the Nation. This vision was based on principal of equality, liberty and fraternity enshrined in our constitution. The vision and mission of this college is reflected in the admission process of the students, the conduct of the teaching faculties, the quality education and in the thrust in extracurricular activities of the students along with academic excellence.

The Mission and Objectives of the college are conveyed to the students and staff by taking the following initiatives:

Our motto also includes promotion of women empowerment by imparting equal opportunities of education and skill development to girls; to promote awareness on ecological and environmental issues; to promote Indian tradition and culture. Our motto comprises to sensitize the students towards social responsibilities and also to promote sports activities.

Our motto is also to spread the philosophy of "Sarva Dharam Sam-bhava", provide Value based education and to provide healthy environment for creativity, innovation and research.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

Our strength is our location which is very prime and in the heart of the city. We have a good infrastructural facilities and a large playground which places us in most suitable position to cater the curricular as well as cocurricular needs of the students. It has very good connectivity and conveyance facilities which makes it favorable for the students. Again our strength is a good and dedicated faculty in arts as well as commerce which takes every measure to find out the hidden talents in students and provide them an environment in which the students are groomed to become an aware, civilized and a responsible citizen of India. Being in the heart of the city we are in an advantageous position to make collaboration with different industries and stakeholders and invite them in our college for campus placements. This also provides an exposure to our students and it helps them to plan for their career and better prospects.

Institutional Weakness

One of our greatest weakness is that we do not have any vocational or technical courses. Thus the students who wish to pursue technical or vocational courses has to go elsewhere. Moreover, we have post graduate courses in only two subjects in arts faculty, whereas there are eight subjects at graduate level. Thus the choice for pursuing post graduate courses gets limited. However we are making our best efforts to get post graduate courses opened in other subjects also.

Institutional Opportunity

We take every care to groom the students into a responsible, law abiding and a successful personality. This

process begins right from the time of admission when teachers counsel the students to choose right subjects as per their talent and previous academic records. Not only for the courses and subjects they are also counseled to participate in different co-curricular activities so that their hidden talents are discovered and are provided a suitable environment to flourish.

Institutional Challenge

A large section of our students come from rural background. A number of times it has come to our notice that the students do not have enough money for taking admission and buying books. We take care that such students get scholarships in time and for that the college keeps regular coordination with social welfare department, Government of Uttar Pradesh. Moreover, if the student is poor and is not covered in any welfare scheme of the government, our institution extends all necessary help through poor boys fund. Also we see that such students get full support from the library where there is no dearth of books. Students can use reading room for studying books and even they can take books home for further reading.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

To keep the curricula up to date and relevant to the needs of society, periodic revisions are made in the curricula of different subjects by the University of Lucknow which is the sole decision making authority in the matter of curriculum development and change in the curricula for all the associate colleges. Some of the senior teachers in different disciplines represent the Board of Studies as members in various subjects to offer their suggestions and comments in the designing of the curriculum. There is a feedback mechanism, which has recently been made mandatory for all departments.

The college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) that meets periodically to discuss the various issues regarding teaching-learning and evaluation. The process of admitting students to various programs is transparent and based on merit. The college follows the guidelines laid down by the University of Lucknow and Government of Uttar Pradesh in all matters of admission including reservation. The courses available are B.A, B.Com, M.A. (Hindi & Sociology) and M.Com (Pure Commerce & Applied Economics).

For a well-rounded development of students, the college offers a proper blend of academics and sports. The College is sensitive to the needs of disadvantaged students for whom counseling and special classes are organized.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The academic progress of a student is carefully and continuously monitored. The teaching and learning method

is increasingly becoming student-oriented. In the campus free internet access is provided to teachers and students through Wi-Fi so that they can use it for self study. We have a central library from which students can borrow books and consult them when they are in campus. However students can borrow books for home also.

The schedule of the examinations is published by the examination department of University of Lucknow, well in advance. The college being one of the associated college of the University of Lucknow follows all the rules and regulations regarding the conduct of the exams. The teachers of the associated college comprises 60% of the total strength of the teachers of the university of Lucknow, so college teachers represent themselves in matter of paper-setting, evaluation of answer sheets and other exams-related activities. The college takes strict action against students indulging in any unfair means during the examination. He/she is debarred from appearing in all the examination for one year besides being given a zero in all the paper of that examination in which he/she was caught adapting unfair means. The College institutes it's internal checking squad comprising of its members of the proctorial board. The college teacher participate in central evaluation conducted by University of Lucknow. The results of the End-Semester Examination and Annual Examinations are declared by the University of Lucknow after the examination is over.

Research, Innovations and Extension

In order to promote research attitude and aptitude among the students and teachers of the institution, research committee has been constituted. Its aim is to provide necessary information for research and it's funding from various national and international agencies such as UGC, ICSSR and other international scholarships. Since we have been permitted to engage in research work of late, we are planning to periodically organise training programs for teachers to upgrade their knowledge in latest research methodology by inviting experts in different discipline. The committee is trying its level best to build up the required infrastructure needed for the research work. The institution provides all infrastructural facilities by upgrading and dressing up library. Moreover , in the last five years the college has organised more than 04 national level seminars. On the individual level teachers have contributed to research activities by getting their research papers published in reputed journals in the country and abroad.

Some of the teachers have been felicitated for their extension activities, too. Extension activities of the college includes blood donation camp, voter awareness camp, social awareness, plantation and cleanliness drives.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college campus is sprawled over approximately 9.572 acers with around 5970 sq.mt. built area. It has 30 large and medium sized lecture rooms for regular classroom studies for the students. The learning spaces are augmented by two smart room which is used for ICT based teaching activities as well as for conducting guest lectures and students seminars by different department. The college has a spacious staff room.

The college has a one large auditorium with stage, store room, green room and washroom etc namely the Purushottam Das Tondon Auditorium with seating capacity of 500 and two medium sized seminar hall namely Century Hall and Shatabdi Hall with seating capacity of 100, 200 respectively. These seminar halls and auditorium are constantly used for academic functions, Seminars, conferences, cultural programs and

interactive sessions of the students and the faculty with eminent resource persons related to academics and industry.

It has a central library with around 13000 titles, 4 regularly subscribed journals and a number of magazines and dailies. The students can consult any books in the reading rooms of the library.

The college has a large playground and volleyball court where students of all the faculties are trained to be good athletes and sport persons. Storehouse of gaming accessories and equipment is available for students and the staff. Annual sports are marked by various competitions and sports programs and register active participation by students of all faculties.

Student Support and Progression

The college is quite keen on providing all possible support to the students in academic and personal fronts. The college adopts a policy of full transparency in its admission process to give all the students a fair chance of admission to this institution irrespective of caste, creed, sex or religion. All the categories of socially disadvantaged students are given fair reservation in admission and provided with scholarship as per the rules and regulations of the UP State Government.

To promote participation of the students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities, the college has active cultural committee and sports committee which organise extra-curricular and sports events with the help of the faculty and encourage students to participate in such events. The college regularly organises cultural event UMANGOTSAV as well as number of sporting events as per the calendar of the college throughout the year.

The institution has a student grievance redressal cell, women cell and other agencies which take care of all sorts of student complaints and help them in speedy redressal.

The pass percentage of the students is impressive and majority of the students pass their courses within time. The teachers of the college work tirelessly to prepare academic calendars and arrange classes. The students are evaluated on continuous and comprehensive bases to ensure their progress throughout the year. Besides this, the college has four units of NSS which helps the students in developing a sense of social responsibility and concern for the nation.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college functions with a view to achieve the spirit of its mission. For that, college has acquired requisite physical infrastructure facilities, intellectual resources and societal goodwill. Its governance is in tune with its vision and thus is participative giving each stakeholder a say in decision making process.

In action plan of the college, first of all, the management and the principal meet at regular intervals. Principal then, meets the various Heads of Department. In turns HODs communicate with their respective faculties. Faculties are directly in touch with the students and are well aware of their problems and aspirations.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution is fully committed to its responsibility towards the environment. The college always takes an environment friendly approach while planning or execution of developmental strategies. The college takes up environment awareness activities like regular tree plantation drives, maintenance of lawns of the college, regulation on burning garden waste and paper, poster and slogan writing competitions etc. Moreover, no hazardous waste is released from the campus. Since the college have good amount of greenery, dry leafs of plants are collected & put in a pit which is then covered by soil. After sometime it gets converted into manure which is then used for plants again. We do not have any liquid e-waste in the campus. So far as e-waste is concerned the discarded electronic equipment, CDs, wires are disposed off by selling them to the recycling agencies. Polythene bags and plastics are banned in the campus and therefore we do not have much solid waste also. Our campus is also plastic free campus & use of polythene bags, other plastic bags is fully banned in the campus.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The Admission Committee keeps a strict vigil on the adherence to Government Policies with respect to the differently abled students. Due weightage is given to them in preparation of merit list so that they can get admitted. It is tried that those students are placed in sections where classes are held on ground floor. Ramps are also built at strategic locations to help them reach the platforms. Library reading rooms are on the ground floor.

Since the college is located in the heart of the city, it caters to a large extent the needs of the students living around the city in various suburbs. These students basically come from rural background where the education provided to them is extremely resource deficient. To bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students and to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice, the following strategies are drawn and deployed by the institution:

- To help the students providing basic knowledge of computer which are delivered in the Computer lab with hands-on experience to the students.
- Extra classes for students, who are weak in any subject, are conducted by the faculty at the end of the session.
- Regular tests, assignments etc. are also a part of the curriculum in order to identify the weak students and the slow learners.

The college sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. by taking the following measures.

- The College regularly organizes seminars, guest lectures etc on such issues.
- Women cell has been formed which sensitizes the girls about their rights and create awareness on gender related issues.
- NSS wing of the college regularly organizes events like river bank cleaning, March on AIDS day, march for saving child labour, against foeticide, voter awareness, plantation, sanitisation etc. to sensitize staff and students on the various environmental and social issues.

Just as the slow learners need special attention, advanced learners also have special needs which have to be taken care of in the similar manner. This is even more difficult because it is upon these students that the pride of the college rests. The college has issued instructions to all the teachers to provide them extra time, guidance and counseling for their better prospects. These students are supported by the teachers by providing them with books from the departmental library. These students are also facilitated by special awards and medals under different categories instituted specially for them by the college. The prize includes books, medals, certificate and cash amount.

Weak students are always at a risk of dropping out and this aspect needs to be tackled very seriously because once a dropout, the students can easily fall prey to all kinds of social evils. Three parameters are most helpful in identifying such students during the program duration.

- Attendance
- Class Tests
- Feedback of teachers about the students

Counseling by teachers is most helpful in many places.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

The need of the hour is to create an environment where the whole teaching-learning activity is centered on the learner. All the facilities, infrastructures and teaching fraternity act as facilitators to create an environment where the students can take the initiative and choose their path. In this context Kalicharan Degree College has tried to incorporate practices in its curriculum to help the institution move towards this goal. The student is made aware of the annual academic calendar of the college. This helps the students to plan their studies in advance.

The departments are directed by IQAC to take students feedback on half yearly basis. The head of the department make proper changes based on the said feedback.

Interaction with experts from different fields of academics and society in form of guest lectures which are organized by all the departments help the student to develop critical thinking and analytical power.

The IQAC is the mother of all initiatives that are taken to help improve the teaching-learning environment. It consults the whole teaching faculty and the students to bring in new ideas for improvement.

The implementation of new ideas is often difficult as they are generally not taken in good spirit by those who have to implement it. The Principal often has to issue strict directives for implementation of new policies. IQAC is vital in establishing a bridge between the two to make the implementation of good practices easier.

Once the activities have started in full flow, a check in the quality is of utmost importance. Since the IQAC has a record of all the activities, it can access the quality and predict the outcome of any exercise. It also assesses the need of new infrastructural facilities.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

The University is in the process of introducing semester system for all levels of all streams and subjects. Semester system has replaced annual examination method in all PG classes already. This will make the evaluation continuous and comprehensive. Assignment based evaluation and project making has also been introduced in the college by various departments.

Almost all the teachers of the college are members of the evaluation system of the University and therefore fully aware of the evaluation process. To ensure that the students are aware of the evaluation process, the institution instructs the teachers to discuss the previous year's question papers in the classroom.

The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own through regular monitoring by the IQAC.

The teachers are encouraged to adopt summative approach of evaluation by the college. Summative assessment includes the evaluation of a group of chapters like units. Teachers are supposed to follow the format of annual examination paper for this type of assessment.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

The University marking pattern does not accord any marks for internal assessment by the teachers in most of the courses. Therefore this exercise is not having its proper impact on the students.

The graduate attributes specified by the college are stated in its vision: to impart education to all the sections of the society to empower them as a class of intellectually; morally and spiritually sound and committed citizens who will become not only professionally qualified but also have a vision for the betterment of the society and the building of the Nation.

The college tries to attain this goal by adopting a holistic approach of student development where the student remains the centre of our universe and everything is planned to improve his/her overall aptitude.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

At the college level, students can directly lodge complaint with the teachers in case he/she are not satisfied with the internal evaluation. If the problem is not solved complaint can be made to the Grievance Redressal Cell where appropriate action can be taken. However, any such complaint has never figured in the Grievance Cell ever. Redressal at the teachers end could be re-totaling, revaluation or even rechecking as the need may arise.

All our day to day activities and efforts of our teachers focus around the central locus of our goal. All academics, co-curricular activities etc are instruments of spreading this awareness. Yes, the institution and individual teachers use the assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. Different departments in Arts, Commerce conduct semester exams (P.G. Classes) of the students to evaluate the level of their understanding and writing skills, their test copies are displayed to them after the assessment and they are suggested ways to improve their performance in the final exams. It gives an opportunity to the students to improve the content and the method of writing and it proves very beneficial for the teachers to plan and modify their teaching methods in the perspective of learning objectives and the requisites of the examination pattern.

Moreover we organize several programmes to sensitize the students, boys and girls on gender issues. During NSS camps also we address the issue by different means. Of late, we made arrangements to equip girl students by Taekwondo Techniques of self defense. Our counseling committee works on the issue on regular basis by providing its counseling.

No hazardous waste is released from the campus. Since the college have good amount of greenery, dry leafs of plants are collected & put in a pit which is then covered by soil. After sometime it gets converted into manure which is then used for plants again. We do not have any liquid e-waste in the campus. So far as e-waste is concerned the discarded electronic equipment, CDs, wires are disposed off by selling them to the recycling agencies. Polythene bags and plastics are banned in the campus and therefore we do not have much solid waste also.

Water Harvesting

The college has been designed in such a manner that central field is at the lowest level and is surrounded by the buildings which occupy higher plinth level. During rainy season, the field gets filled with water and acts as a small reservoir to allow percolation of water to the water table. Roof top harvesting is also there. In our new buildings constructed in the campus we have rain harvesting mechanism. Rain water is collected on roof top which is then drained into the small reservoir made for this purpose. Thus we have a well designed water-harvesting system in our campus.

We organise functions and events of different types on National festivals and birth/death of the great Indian personalities. On 15th of August and 26th of January flag is hoisted in the campus and there after teacher and students give their performances and speeches. A good cultural programme is held and thereafter sweets are distributed among students and the staff. Similarly we celebrate birth anniversary of S.C. Bose on 23rd January, B.R. Ambedkar on 14th April, M.K. Gandhi on 2nd October, Sardar Patel on 31st October and so on. And on the aforesaid days cultural programmes are held, where college staff and students take part enthusiastically. Sometimes guest lectures are also arranged on such occations. On 11th August we celebrate the birth anniversary of Sri. Kalicharan Ji, who participated in the first conference of Indian National Congress held in 1885 and on whose name this college is establised. We also celebrate 5th September as teachers day, the birth anniversary of Sarvapalli Radhakrishnan and on that day a number of programmes are arranged. Similarly we celebrate 14th November as children's day also.

The college administration maintains utmost transparency in all its activities. Starting from admission process, it is done online on the basis of merit. Cut-off marks are published in reputed dailies and is also put on the notice board and college website. All fees are taken through bank challans and bank drafts. We do not accept fees in cash. Regarding other financial transactions we get it audited by our C.A. and then by local fund auditor of U.P. Government on annual basis. As regards scholarship it is transferred to personal accounts of students by social welfare department, Government of U.P. Moreover we are covered under RTI act 2005 and we respond to queries immediately. Thus our whole administrative, academic, financial

structure is transparent.

By and large all the practices stated in NAAC format are pursued by the college in one way or the other. However we will dwell on two best practices i.e. curricular aspects and IQAC activities. As regards curricular aspects we have two faculties namely Arts and Commerce, in arts faculty the subjects taught comprise of A.I.H., sociology, Hindi, Asian Culture, Political Science, Economics, Education, Physical education. We also run P.G. Classes in Sociology and Hindi. In commerce faculty we have B.Com as well as P.G. M.Com (Pure) and M.Com(Applied Economics) also. Besides running regular classes we organise guest lectures, seminars, group discussions, counseling programmes in collaboration with industries to sharpen the acumen of students and provide them good exposure. We have ICT enabled classroom to impart the students education by applying newer techniques. We take regular feedback from students and also engage students counsel in developing ways and means for the enhancement of education. As regard the second best practice an IQAC cell is formed on 18-07-2017. IQAC monitors the all round development of curricular, co-curricular and other infrastructure facilities through the help of its various subcommittees. All the sub-committees hold their meetings from time to time and forward their details to IQAC cell, which in term makes a detailed analysis and thereafter forwards its suggestions to college administration for effective implementation.

Its our mission and well defined objective to impart education not only to the students of privileged class but also to the unprivileged and underprivileged classes of the society. Our college keeps in touch with social welfare department Government of U.P so that not even the single student fails in getting the scholarship due to him. If there are cases who are not covered under the government scheme we provide help through our poor boys fund. Moreover we run remedial classes and extra classes for such students. Our career counseling committee also provides counseling to such students from time to time. During our sports and cultural activities out teaching faculties encourages such students to take more and more participation so that their confidence is enhanced and their personality gets developed.
